Ed Brumby will share his 30 years of research on the men of the 71 <sup>st</sup> Fraser Highland Regiment during the American Revolutionary War, how they were granted land in Guysborough County, and what became of them.

How would we begin, and what methods might we adopt? In this illustrated talk, archaeologist Dr. Jonathan Fowler answers these questions with examples from cemeteries and mass graves in Nova Scotia.
